And three, our approach to working in partnership remains essential in a rapidly changing world.

Putting farmers at the center of sustainable agriculture in Canada

The Canada Program, in collaboration with Collective Impact, is proudly launching a series of model farms as part of a groundbreaking Model Farm Network program. These farm trials show how sustainable practices can improve crop yields, cut costs and protect the environment. Farmers will also get expert advice and explore new ways to earn income from the growing demand for sustainably produced food—demand projected to rise sharply as the world population approaches 9.7 billion by 2050.

The first Model Farm Network is being launched in Saskatchewan, with expansion planned for Manitoba and Alberta. Each network is led by a dedicated sustainability coordinator and will trial sustainable practices on commercial farmland over five years. The initiative also offers per-acre incentive payments to offset costs and reduce financial risk.

By demonstrating sustainable farming practices in key agricultural communities and hosting annual field days, each network will create meaningful, local opportunities for farmers to share knowledge, strengthen community ties and build resilience together. Long-term data collection will track agronomic, economic and ecological outcomes, offering insights into the benefits of sustainable practices such as crop diversification, soil health improvement, and more efficient nutrient and pesticide use.

This project is a critical component of our Aspen Parkland Agricultural Initiative (APAI), a collaborative program accelerating sustainable agriculture across Canada's Aspen Parkland. APAI brings together farmers, agribusinesses, government agencies and Indigenous communities to overcome barriers, support farms and influence policies that facilitate adoption of sustainable land management practices.

Tony was drawn to the Canada Program's approach to conservation, which focuses on building solutions through collaboration. He is excited to join a team known for bringing together diverse interests—from Indigenous communities and scientists to policymakers and industry leaders—to design and deliver wide-ranging solutions. Our commitment to Indigenous-led conservation was a key motivator for Tony, offering the opportunity to codevelop approaches that advance reconciliation and sustainable development while learning from generations of Indigenous knowledge.

He also recognizes our ability to scale impact and drive systems-level change. The Canada Program is part of The Nature Conservancy's global network of science, innovation and partnerships, enabling the organization to accelerate progress on climate and conservation goals in Canada while contributing to global impact.

Tony holds a Master of Environmental Studies from the University of Waterloo and a Bachelor of Environmental Science from Royal Roads University. He lives in Kitchener, Ontario, where he spends as much time as possible hiking, paddling and cycling—activities that continue to inspire his work.

Over the past 40 years, the Canada Program has helped set the stage for remarkable conservation gains across Canada—including the landmark Great Bear Rainforest agreement which protected and sustainably managed 19 million acres and the establishment of the 6.5-million-acre Thaidene Nëné Indigenous Protected Area. Along with Nature United, our Canadian affiliate, we work in partnership with Indigenous and local communities, governments and businesses to create change. We are part of an ambitious global effort to change the trajectory of our future by 2030.
